County Cost Share

The SWCD has County Cost Share (CCS) grants still available! CCS funds conservation projects in crop, range, and/or riparian areas. We have made some changes to our CCS program. Haul roads and boundary fence are no longer limited by product/distance. You can now apply for those projects the same as the other projects. Fligible projects include cross and border fencing, haul roads

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jects the same as the other projects. Eligible projects include **cross and border fencing**, **haul roads**, **spring development**, **solar water development**, **weed treatment**, **range seeding**, **riparian restoration**, **and more**. Projects up to \$20,000 have a 75% cost share rate. Our completion deadline for all CCS projects is now 2 years from the date of approval. Call the SWCD at 541-565-3216 to learn more or to apply. There is no deadline to apply. Applications are reviewed every month at SWCD board meetings.

Sherman County Area Watershed Council

Small Grant Funding Available!

We have Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB) funding available. Sherman County has two Small Grant Areas, Lower John Day and the Lower Deschutes. The Small Grant Program awards up to \$15,000 for on the ground restoration projects.

Eligible projects include:

- Livestock and wildlife water developments

- Range seeding

- Riparian planting



Odds and Ends

Range Drill

A Range Drill is available to landowners/operators to rent from the SWCD. It's primary function is to be able to accurately apply grass seed to rangeland areas that are too difficult for standard equipment, but it can be used to enhance existing pastures, improve decadent grass stands, or establish food plots. The drill is capable of applying any size of grass or grain seed at a 10 ft width on 12 inch spacing. It weighs approximately 4,000 lbs and is capable of being pulled with a standard three quarter ton pickup over most moderate terrain. FSA Deadlines and Important Dates

- September 30, 2024 End of USDA Fiscal year
- **September 30, 2024:** Deadline for ALL signatures to be received and enrollment complete for late-filed ARCPLC Contracts, Deadline for all CRP/CREP/Grasslands signatures on contracts
- October 14, 2024: USDA Service Center Closed in observance of Columbus Day
- November 11, 2024: USDA Service Center Closed in observance of Veteran's Day
- December 2, 2024: Last day for COC ballots to be counted
- December 15, 2024: Deadline to report Fall Seeded Acreage

Report Banking Changes to FSA

Farm Service Agency (FSA) program payments are issued electronically into your bank account. In order to receive timely payments, you need to notify your FSA servicing office if you close your account or if your bank information is changed for any reason (such as your financial institution merging or being purchased). Payments can be delayed if FSA is not notified of changes to account and bank routing numbers.

For some programs, payments are not made until the following year. For example, payments for crop year 2023 through the Agriculture Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage program aren't paid until 2024. If the bank account was closed due to the death of an individual or dissolution of an entity or partnership before the payment was issued, please notify your local FSA office as soon as possible to claim your payment.

Obtaining Payments Due to Deceased Producers

In order to claim a Farm Service Agency (FSA) payment on behalf of a deceased producer, all program conditions for the payment must have been met before the applicable producer's date of death.

If a producer earned a FSA payment prior to his or her death, the following is the order of precedence for the representatives of the producer:

- administrator or executor of the estate
- the surviving spouse
- surviving sons and daughters, including adopted children
- surviving father and mother
- surviving brothers and sisters
- heirs of the deceased person who would be entitled to payment according to the State law

For FSA to release the payment, the legal representative of the deceased producer must file a form FSA-325 to claim the payment for themselves or an estate. The county office will verify that the application, contract, loan agreement, or other similar form requesting payment issuance, was signed by the applicable deadline by the deceased or a person legally authorized to act on their behalf at that time of application.

If the application, contract or loan agreement form was signed by someone other than the deceased participant, FSA will determine whether the person submitting the form has the legal authority to submit the form.

Payments will be issued to the respective representative's name using the deceased program participant's tax identification number. Payments made to representatives are subject to offset regulations for debts owed by the deceased.

FSA is not responsible for advising persons in obtaining legal advice on how to obtain program benefits that may be due to a participant who has died, disappeared or who has been declared incompetent.

Annual Review of Payment Eligibility for New Crop Year Beginning 10/01/2024

FSA and NRCS program applicants for benefits are required to submit a completed CCC-902 Farming Operation Plan and CCC-941 Average Gross Income (AGI) Certification and Consent to Disclosure of Tax Information for FSA to determine the applicant's payment eligibility and establish the maximum payment limitation applicable to the program applicant.

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Farm Service Agency (FSA) Continued

Participants are not required to annually submit new CCC-902s for payment eligibility and payment limitation purposes unless a change in the farming operation occurs that may affect the previous determination of record. A valid CCC-902 filed by the participant is considered to be a continuous certification used for all payment eligibility and payment limitation determinations applicable for the program benefits requested.

Participants are responsible for ensuring that all CCC-902 and CCC-941 and related forms on file in the county office are updated, current, and correct. Participants are required to timely notify the county office of any changes in the farming operation that may affect the previous determination of record by filing a new or updated CCC-902 as applicable.

Changes that may require a NEW determination include, but are not limited to, a change of:

- Shares of a contract, which may reflect:
- A land lease from cash rent to share rent
- A land lease from share rent to cash rent (subject to the cash rent tenant rule
- A modification of a variable/fixed bushel-rent arrangement
- The size of the producer's farming operation by the addition or reduction of cropland that may affect the application of a cropland factor
- The structure of the farming operation, including any change to a member's share
- The contribution of farm inputs of capital, land, equipment, active personal labor, and/or active personal management
- Farming interests not previously disclosed on CCC-902 including the farming interests of a spouse or minor child
- Certifications of average AGI are required to be filed annually for participation in an annual USDA program. For multi-year conservation contracts and NRCS easements, a certification of AGI must be filed prior to approval of the contract or easement and is applicable for the duration of the contract period.

Participants are encouraged to file or review these forms within the deadlines established for each applicable program for which program benefits are being requested.

Sherman County Fair

The Sherman County SWCD, Sherman County Prevention, and Sherman County Public/School Library hosted 2 days of nature crafting in the old beef barn at the fair. This year's theme was "May the Forest Be with You Always". The kids created habitats for animals and bugs, painted wood round necklaces and wooden snakes, designed nature journals, and more. 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Library Summer Reading Program "Dig In!"






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
Eastern Lower Deschutes Strategic Implementation Area (SIA)

The Eastern Lower Deschutes watershed has been selected by the Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA) as one of their Strategic Implementation Areas. This is a program in which ODA evaluates agricultural activities across the state to identify opportunities to improve water quality.

Eastern Lower Deschutes Strategic Implementation Area


